We believe that every child on the autism spectrum has the right to play sports.


We believe that every individual on the spectrum and their family has the right to meaningful social connections.

Our staff embraced the virtual world. Within a month, we launched Zoom-based programs. Today, CAN runs 16 virtual programs, keeping participants active and engaged, while remaining safe at home. Similarly, our Training and Community Engagement team has taken workshops online. With the support of likeminded organizations, we have reached community members across the globe in 2020.

We are overjoyed with our newfound success in the online environment. But like we've seen throughout our 13-year history, nothing compares to the joy of seeing CAN participants succeed in our programs face to face. In August, we successfully reintroduced in-person programs. With strict health protocols in place, we are on pace for a return to pre-COVID numbers by summer 2021.

Lastly, at a time when most non-profits experienced a decrease in capacity, CAN rapidly expanded our employment services. With government funding, we launched four new initiatives to support autistic job seekers, inclusive employers and service agencies.

Our impact has never been possible without great support. We were fortunate to have two major fundraisers take place pre-COVID. Together, the CAN Pro-Am, presented by Hudson Pacific Properties, and the REVEAL Gala, presented by BMO, brought in a combined \$1.6 million.

Beyond these events, our supporters showed just how much they believe in our work – donations from individuals and corporations exceeded all expectations. In particular, the Canucks for Kids Fund's ongoing contributions were bolstered by a 50/50 Super Jackpot that surpassed \$1 million. Our endless gratitude goes out to our entire community of support.

2020 forced CAN to navigate more change and uncertainty than ever before. But this past year has proved that resilience, hope and passion for a worthwhile cause can overcome anything.

We intend to come out of the pandemic with even more opportunities for our members to be understood, accepted and supported where they live. Until then, know that our commitment to the entire CAN community is stronger than ever.



Our Response to COVID-19


Programs shift online

- In response to COVID, we were forced to suspend all programs and events in March.
- Within a week, CAN coaches hosted "Virtual Team Meetings" on social media.
- By April, CAN launched new weekly programs with live instruction over Zoom.

Re-introduction of in-person programs

- With new health and safety protocols and an emphasis on spacious, outdoor venues, CAN re-launched inperson programs and family experiences in August.
- By October, weekly programs returned indoors with an emphasis on individual, hands-free activities and reduced participant sizes.
- Despite the challenges of COVID, we successfully delivered over 7,000 inperson and virtual program spaces in 2020.

16 new virtual programs were introduced in 2020, filling over 300 program spaces.

iPads secured for families in Northern BC

Thanks to the new virtual format, families in Northern BC will be able to directly access CAN programs for the first time this past year.

In order to eliminate all possible barriers to participation, CAN will launch a new program to loan iPads loaded with monthly data, completely free of charge. Already, dozens of families in Prince George, Prince Rupert and Kitimat have benefited from this new initiative.

Jays Care a home run with CAN participants

Thanks to CAN's ongoing partnership with Jays Care Foundation, we were able to diversify our online program offerings with Challenger Baseball.

In addition to guest coaching appearances, Jays Care Foundation supplied each participant with kits of baseball equipment. Kits were shipped to each household, allowing participants to follow along with each lesson and enjoy the sport long after the pandemic.







Over 5,000 members benefiting from Family Experiences







With an emphasis on physical distancing and wide, outdoor spaces, we restructured CAN Family Experiences to ensure our members were accessing opportunities safely.

Highlights included annual traditions like the Chilliwack Corn Maze and new experiences like the PNE WinterLights.

In total, we facilitated 12 Family Experiences in 2020, providing over 5,000 members with cherished memories to last a lifetime!

In partnership with ACT, CAN VP Stephanie Jull presented to 200 parents, caregivers, and community professionals. With a focus on helping children thrive in rec settings, the 2-day webinar reached individuals as far as Brazil and the Philippines.

The ACT workshops were supported by POPARD, Government of Canada's Emergency Support Fund, and the Vancouver Foundation.





Parks Canada - Learn-to Camp

Parks Canada to increase inclusion in outdoor rec spaces. Parks Canada offered a series of Learnto Camp online events for CAN families. Our members gathered over Zoom to learn about trip preparedness, animal safety and COVID safety.

With an emphasis on collaboration across organizations, accessibility training also included BC Parks, Power To Be and the Inter-Cultural Association of Greater Victoria.



Employment Programs & Services

Two years ago, CAN launched Employment Programs and Services with a goal to increase inclusive hiring and job opportunities for autistic youth and adults.

We began by providing individualized support to employers and job seekers – empowering both with the resources necessary to succeed.

This past year, employment recovery became a sudden priority nation-wide. CAN secured federal funding and hired six new office staff to oversee six projects to further our impact.

CAN developed new multi-week programs to provide hands-on skills and experience to autistic youth and adults. We have begun working with employment service agencies to better understand how to support job seekers and employees on the spectrum.

Most importantly, our new suite of Employment Programs and Services will allow CAN to provide a multifront approach to increasing inclusive employment in our community.













CAN's Employment Programs and Services are generously funded by Ready, Willing & Able, the Government of Canada's Employment Recovery Project and the Youth Employment and Skills Strategy Program.

Individualized Support

Customized solutions to both inclusive employers and job seekers

Through direct outreach, CAN connects employers with resources and training to increase inclusivity. We also work one-to-one with autistic youth and adults to understand their individual needs and refer them to the appropriate service agencies or employers.

Skills Development and Work Experience

Paid opportunities for autistic youth and adults

Over the course of 12 weeks, our **Skills Training Employment Program (STEP)** provides participants with certifications, pre-employment skills and a work experience placement in their community. On a shorter-term basis, **Project Fast Track** provides 1-4 week placements in a variety of sectors.

Training Development

For employment service agencies

In order to better understand the needs of autistic job seekers, we enlisted their direct feedback and leadership in two new projects. Led by a hub of autistic self-advocates, **Project Relay** will provide a series of workshops for employment service professionals across BC in early 2021. Meanwhile, the Building Blocks initiative will allow us to begin developing online training modules to be accessed at any time by employment professionals.

Virtual Job Fair

Connecting the entire inclusive hiring community

Our work has involved direct collaboration and outreach with three different audiences – autistic job seekers, businesses and employment service agencies. The **Virtual Job Fair** in February 2021 will connect all three with one another in a month-long series of workshops and presentations over Zoom.

Reveal Gala

The 2020 Reveal Gala, presented by BMO Bank of Montreal, returned to the home of the Vancouver Canucks for the fourth time in support of Canucks Autism Network.

Titled The Greatest Show on Earth, the vintage, circus-themed evening raised \$1.022 million under the "big top" at Rogers Arena.

Co-chaired by Clara Aquilini and Jill Killen, and emceed by Grammy-winning NYC entertainer, Rizo, guests were dazzled with an unforgettable evening of laughter, circus talent, magic and music under the "big top".

With surprise appearances from Freddie Highmore and Paige Spara from The Good Doctor, the evening culminated with an inspiring performance of "This Is Me" by the CAN Choir and a heartfelt thank you from CAN mother Claire Zanatta.

CAN Pro-Am

Presented by Hudson Pacific Properties, the second CAN Pro-Am was a hockey dream come true for amateur rec players. After months of fundraising, 19 teams came together for a weekend with NHL Alumni, raising over \$675,000 for Canucks Autism Network.

The weekend kicked off with a Hotstove Luncheon, featuring panels with Daniel and Henrik Sedin, Todd Bertuzzi, Brendan Morrison, and Brad May.

The Odlum Brown Bulls took the CANley Cup again this year, topping the fundraising standings and earning the right to draft Bertuzzi first overall. Over the course of the next two days, all 19 teams hit the ice at UBC -- each with an NHL Alumni on their roster.

It was a weekend that clearly demonstrated the transformative power of sport. Because when the last buzzer sounded, the biggest winners were ultimately the thousands of CAN participants who have benefited from the charity event.


CAN Virtual Challenge

Due to the restrictions on largescale events, we shifted our fundraising efforts online to host the first-ever CAN Virtual Challenge, powered by YVR Vancouver International Airport!

Held over 10 days, fundraisers completed daily challenges promoting movement, creativity, and fun! Participants posted their completed challenges to social media to encourage donations from their friends, family and co-workers.

118 individuals and 18 teams came together to raise over \$89,800, nearly doubling the goal for this online initiative.

The top individual fundraiser title went to Declan Taylor, a CAN participant, who singlehandedly raised over \$4,000 for CAN.

50/50 Super Jackpot

For the first time this past Fall, the Canucks For Kids Fund hosted a special 50/50 Super Jackpot exclusively in support of CAN. Proceeds from ticket sales were meant to replace the cancellation or postponement of key inperson fundraising events like the CAN Pro-Am, HM Commercial Ride, and Fishing For Kids Tournament.

With a guaranteed jackpot of \$1 million, both CAN and the Canucks For Kids Fund underwent an unprecedented off-season campaign to promote the draw.

The final total reached \$1,124,100 with the winner splitting the jackpot with CAN – an incredible contribution to the cause!

From the Treasurer



We entered fiscal 2020 with the objective of growing and diversifying our revenue sources while delivering quality programs on a breakeven or better basis.

Of course, everything changed in March 2020 and our aspirations took second place to merely surviving and safeguarding the organization we had built over the years.

The CAN management team responded to the year's challenges in a calm, focused and effective manner. We focused on preserving the team and our infrastructure (most notably, our lease commitments) so that we would be ready when the world once again opened up.

Remarkably, we were fortunate to close out the year with a surplus on operations. This was achieved due to a number of factors:

- We were able to complete two significant fundraising events before the pandemic-induced restrictions began.
- Our management team effectively led cost-cutting measures that sustained core operations.
- CAN accessed government funding, made available due to COVID, to bridge operational costs through the lockdown period.

Fiscal 2020 was not the year we expected. However, CAN has emerged strong, viable and focused. We remain as dedicated as ever to serving our provincial community. Thanks to strong leadership, we have retained the human and capital resources required to reinvigorate our programs.

We look forward to fiscal 2021 and beyond to get back to growing our program offerings and our importance to individuals on the autism spectrum and their families.
