CANUCKS AUTISM NETWORK TO BRING VITAL AUTISM TRAINING TO NORTHERN BC



In an effort to increase capacity for supporting individuals with autism, Canucks Autism Network (CAN) is returning to Northern BC to provide autism training to key groups in the community. CAN's training tour will take place from February 5th to February 9th, 2018, with six scheduled workshops in Kitimat, Terrace, and Prince Rupert.

The goal of the training tour is to share knowledge and proven strategies for supporting individuals with autism in the classroom, home, and community settings. In addition, first responders will be provided with crucial training that will help to identify autism in order to safely and effectively respond to situations that arise involving individuals on the spectrum.

Canucks Autism Network's VP of Programs and Training, Dr. Stephanie Jull, PhD, BCBA-D, will be the workshop presenter, bringing with her over 10 years' experience teaching staff in home, school, and community settings to provide effective support to individuals on the autism spectrum. After visiting communities in Northern BC last May, this year's series of workshops marks the second consecutive year CAN has embarked on this tour.
